

Financial Career Insight Series: Preparing For Financial Interviews

If your ambitions are financial market related i.e. Investment Banking, Investment Management, Financial Vendors, Ratings Agencies etc... (see 'The Financial Market Career Landscape Summary' Insight document for sector descriptions) then a certain level of financial knowledge is required to excel during the interview process. Some sectors obviously require more financial knowledge than others but an understanding which demonstrates a keen interest in the subject, as well as personal endeavour, is needed to impress.

If Investment Banking or Investment Management is your target you are going to need a degree of theoretical knowledge e.g. "Explain Discounted Cash Flows to me." "Explain Bond Yield To Maturity." Even more importantly, you are going to need to know how Investments Banks and financial markets operate and, at a basic level, have a good grasp of current financial topics to answer such questions as "What is the outlook for US Interest Rates?" "Where is the oil price currently and why?"

If this sounds challenging don't worry. Nobody is expecting you to be an expert; at the end of the day financial employers are looking for raw talent with potential and not the 'finished article'. You will become that expert once you've worked a few years at that financial institution. Instead, a broad basic understanding of financial topics, markets and instruments is required at interview.

You CANNOT absorb this material two weeks before the interview or Assessment Centre; it is information you need to incorporate into your weekly routine whether you are Year 1, 2, 3 or Masters student.

Another good way to follow the markets is to read the Financial Times especially the front page and Markets section.

Financial Institutions

As well as understanding the main topics and drivers of financial markets when you arrive at interview you need to have at least a basic understanding of:

- the structure of the industry
- the different business sectors within that institution
- what individuals do in any particular role
- the basic process of how a new financial deal happens e.g. a new bond issue

Another great potential source of information is University Alumni who work in the financial industry. Do not be afraid of reaching out here. LinkedIn is a good way to initially approach. Asking somebody for 10 minutes of their time so you can ask them what they do day-to-day in their job and to hear any advice they may be able to share is really a flattering request for someone to receive; they will likely agree to this. Once you connect in this way, who knows what might happen (but be careful not to ask them for a job!). Networking is a big topic in itself. Contacting financial individuals like this is also another great 'story' to use at interview about what motivated you to target this industry!

Quick Tips:

- Early background preparation for financial interview is needed for success.

- Understand what happens within financial institutions; business sectors, job roles and associated daily activities.
